Pastors' Column for March Newsletter:

Do-Over

Here we are in the midst of Lent. While various Christian groups differ in their calculations of exactly how long the season lasts and just which customs should be employed for honoring the season, there is general agreement on what character the observance of Lent should take. And the character prescribed for Lent is decidedly solemn and reflective. Lent is customarily observed by repentance, atonement, and self-denial.

But why would anyone want to promote such a season? Why not encourage more upbeat components of a life of faith? Wouldn't that be more appealing?

Well, the Church from very early days instituted its pattern of worship across the year, including the solemnity of Lent, not because it was a guaranteed crowd-pleaser, but because it answered a deep human need – the need to face our failings, wash them from our reservoir of guilt, and move on to new beginnings at Easter. Lent offers us a much-needed opportunity to wipe the slate clean and start again.

And isn't a fresh start, in one area of our lives or another, virtually universally desired? Second chances and do-overs are essential because day in and day out we vulnerable human beings face irresistible temptations. What are your temptations? Can you identify them? Maybe they reveal themselves in what you dream about, or long for, or use to comfort yourself, or block out pain. As Rev. Barbara Brown Taylor once put it, 99 percent of us are probably addicted to something whose tempting qualities we can't resist, whether it's eating, shopping, achieving, hoarding, blaming, resenting, care-taking, or even pleasing.

But if temptations are inevitable in every life, succumbing to them is not. Reflective times, such as Lent, grant us an opportunity to recognize that if we have been filling ourselves with our temptations' transient and partial satisfactions, then we are just filling and refilling an empty place within us that could be far better filled. We have an opportunity to be filled instead with the goodness of God's gracious forgiveness and compassionate love. We have the chance in Lent to face our failings, ask for pardon for our complicity in life's pitfalls and snares, and move on to something better. Fresh start. Second chance. Do-over. Let's make the most of it.

- 1- The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM
- 2- Pastor Bob began our meeting with prayer
- 3- Minutes October 14, 2020 Jan motioned to accept the October meeting minutes as written. Kari seconded the motion which passed unanimously.
- 4- Trustees Report
 - a. <u>Trustees</u>- Randy provided the Trustees Report in Carmen's absence.

Revenue for November, 2020 \$10,900, Revenue for December, 2020 \$16,828

Total Revenue received in 2019 \$41,410

Total Revenue received in 2020 \$ 37,606 (\$3804 less than 2019)

Total Pledges - 21 for \$58,400

Three CD's are maturing. Trustees have discussed how the principles are rarely touched and have decided to invest in some longer CD's to get better rates. Randy was asked if people were making donations through the Facebook Live option. It was noted that most donations are being sent thru the mail to the church office. The church has seen the number and amount of pledges increase. Pastor Bob asked if last year's pledge people are phoned prior to Piedge Sunday. The process we currently use, to send a letter, was explained. Pastor Bob noted that the "phone call" can provide an explanation as to the "whys" to not giving.

5. Other Committee Reports

a. Christian Education - Kari described the Christmas Pageant program held December 20th as part of the church service. She described how our 7 children were cast into the parts for the program "The Three Trees" and how taping took place amid COVID regulations. The kids were excited to perform and all did a great job. Pam Gould and Kari designed the set, Bridget made the costumes and Carmen K. made the boat and cross props. The kids were brought in family by family to tape their parts. Nathan Warner put all the tapings together for a smooth program.

Pam, Kari, Miriam and Emily Jungclaus and Bridget put together Christmas Eve Care bags for church members to pick up prior to the service. In addition to Communion packets and church program, the bags held a candle to light, words of caring and encouragement, coloring books and crayons, and chocolate treats to share.

6. Pastor's Report

a) Pastor Bob commented on feeling there was a semblance of normalcy in our Facebook Live services. Christmas was very successful with the addition of live music and singers (Bob's son, Taylor and his sister, Autumn, who both have a substantial music background.

Pastor Bob commented on how beautiful the church looked in the candle light and how proud our congregation should be of the traditions we've kept alive over the years. Pastor Casey spoke of How to be the Church, the high number of Facebook attendees. Pastor Bob commented that the COVID numbers are coming down and it might not be too long before we can be together, in church, again.

7. Old Business

a.
